ORDINANCE ENACTING RENTAL DWELLING LICENSING PROVISIONS

The following ordinance was presented to the Board of Commissioners upon second reading:

AN ORDINANCE ENACTING RENTAL DWELLING LICENSING PROVISIONS

Summary

This Ordinance adds Code of Ordinances Chapter 200 to require owners to acquire a rental dwelling license by July 1 of each year, to require owners to pay a late fee of \$50 for any applications filed after July 1st; to provide that all rental dwellings shall comply with all provisions of applicable city fire, zoning, life safety, housing, nuisance, property maintenance, and building codes; to provide that the Codes Enforcement Officer is authorized to make

inspections upon receiving a complaint or observing the existence of exterior damage, excess weed and grass, or prohibited trash set out, or where an employee reasonably believes a condition exists that relates to life or safety issue; owners shall be charged a fee of \$30 per inspected rental dwelling but fees shall not exceed \$100 per rental dwelling and no owner shall be assessed more than \$500 in inspection fees in one calendar year; no notice shall be required for an inspection of the exterior rental dwelling or for any inspection made for life or safety issue; for interior inspection, except those made for life or safety issue, the rental inspector shall attempt to contact the owner and contact the tenant, if the rental inspector is unable to obtain consent, he may apply to the Court to obtain a warrant to obtain legal access; notice of violation shall be provided to the owner providing for thirty days to make corrections and a notice to the tenant shall be posted on the rental dwelling; the Codes Enforcement Officer is authorized to suspend rental dwelling licenses if the licensing deficiencies are not remedied within thirty days; the Codes Enforcement Officer shall mail notice of suspension of the rental property dwelling license to the owner setting forth the specific reasons for the failure and that the license has been suspended; the notice shall also provide the information that when the rental dwelling license has been suspended, the rental dwelling may not be reoccupied or rented until proof has been provided to the Codes Enforcement Officer that all violations have been corrected and the rental dwelling license is reinstated or reissued; the owner may appeal the suspension to the Codes Enforcement Board within seven days; the Codes Enforcement Officer, shall reinspect the dwelling units upon notice that the violations have been remedied but shall not be required to do so more often than once every thirty days; the owner may appeal a determination of violation to the Codes Enforcement Board within seven days of receipt; when any rental dwelling is condemned, the rental dwelling license shall be suspended; the Codes Enforcement Board shall hear appeals not less than three days and not more than thirty days from the date the appeal is received; the decision of the Codes Enforcement Board shall be reduced to writing and shall be final unless continued; parties may appeal a final decision of the Codes Enforcement Board to Mason Circuit Court; when a rental dwelling license has been denied or suspended the dwelling unit shall be vacated and not rented again until the owner is properly licensed; the owner shall be subject to fines under Code of Ordinances Section 11.01 (D) (2); and the City shall have a lien for fines.

WHEREAS, it is the goal of the City that disadvantaged business enterprises be utilized to the fullest extent possible in connection with this project, and the definite procedures shall be established and administered to ensure that disadvantaged businesses shall have maximum feasible opportunity to compete for contracts when procuring construction contracts, supplies, equipment contracts or consultant and other services.

This Ordinance amends Code of Ordinances Section 320.411.3 to delete the provision that political signs may be erected not earlier than thirty days prior to the election and removed within five days following the election at the expense of the candidate; amends Code of Ordinances Section 320.411.4 to state that changing signs are prohibited except signs meeting the requirements of Section 320.411.41; and adds Code of Ordinances Section 320.411.41 to permit electronic message signs except in R1-R2, TH-1, MH, A-I, A-2, the Maysville Historic District, Washington Historic District, and Renaissance Districts, requires that the display contain monochromatic static messages only without movement, allows for messages to be changed once every sixty minutes; requires the change of messages to be accomplished immediately; and limits electronic message signs to 25% of the maximum sign area in the zone where the sign is to be located.
