ORDINANCE SETTING AD VALOREM TAX RATE FOR 2018

AN ORDINANCE SETTING CITY OF MAYSVILLE AD VALOREM TAX LEVIES ON MOTOR VEHICLES DUE IN 2019 AND ON ALL OTHER TAXABLE PROPERTY DUE IN 2018 AND LEVYING A FRANCHISE TAX ON FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS DUE IN 2019.

WHEREAS, the 2019 ad valorem tax rate on motor vehicles is fixed by KRS 132.487(2) at the rate which could have been levied on 1 January 1983 assessments; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners hereby foregoes any other ad valorem tax increases for 2018 which would result from raising and compensating tax rate, as authorized by KRS 132.027; and

WHEREAS, KRS 136.575 authorizes a franchise tax on financial institutions measured by deposits in the institutions located within the city at a rate up to 0.025% of the deposits, due by 31 January 2019.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF MAYSVILLE, KENTUCKY, as follows:

(1) That for the use and benefit of the General Fund, there is hereby levied the following ad valorem taxes on each \$100.00 of assessed value taxable by the City:

- a) \$0.2460 on motor vehicles taxable in 2019, pursuant to KRS 132.487;
- b) \$0.160 on all other real and personal property taxable in 2018, pursuant to KRS 92.280 and 132.027, and Kentucky Constitution section 157.

(2) That for the use and benefit of the General Fund, there is levied a franchise tax on financial institutions equal to 0.025 percent of deposits in such institutions located within and taxable by the City, to be billed by the City by 1 December 2018 and due with two percent discount if paid by 31 December 2018 or without discount if paid by 31 January 2019, pursuant to KRS 136.575.

(3) That the City Clerk shall notify the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet of the ad valorem tax and franchise tax rates hereby levied by 1 October 2018.

(4) The text of this Ordinance shall be published in full.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF DRONES

SUMMARY

This Ordinance adds a Chapter regulating the operation of unmanned aircraft systems; prohibiting operation of unmanned aircraft systems on city property without written consent when the person is within 500 feet of any outdoor event or at or within 500 feet of the Mason County Detention Center, prohibiting use on City property at or within 500 feet of the any park unless operation is permitted in the park by designation of the City Manager, prohibiting operation of unmanned aircraft when the person is on City property within five hundred feet of any public or private school or day care; prohibiting operation of unmanned aircraft on City property or within five hundred feet of city buildings, including City Hall, Police Station and Fire Station; and prohibiting operation of unmanned aircraft on City property or within five hundred feet of emergency responses, fire and police department scenes and training exercises of the Police and Fire Departments. The Chapter makes it unlawful to operate unmanned aircraft systems while under the influence of alcoholic beverages or a controlled or illegal substances; to operate an unmanned aircraft system that has been equipped with weapons; or to operate in a careless or reckless manner. The operator of an unmanned aircraft system that is involved in a crash resulting in injury or death to a person or damage to the property of another must remain at the scene of the accident and provide information. Use of unmanned aircraft for voyeurism or harassment is prohibited. The penalty for violation of this Chapter is a Class III violation under Code of Ordinances §11.01.

AN ORDINANCE REVISING CODE OF ORDINANCES §197

SUMMARY

This Ordinance revises Code of Ordinances §197 to include in the definitions of discrimination, sex, age, gender identity, sexual orientation, family status or physical disability, to add a definition for gender, add a definition for hearing officer, and to add a definition for sexual orientation. This Ordinance deletes the previous unlawful practices section, adds a section authorizing working agreements with the Kentucky Commission on Human Rights, and makes it unlawful to discriminate in any way prohibited by Kentucky Statutes based upon race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age, gender identity, sexual orientation, disability, familial status or physical disability of any kind. This Ordinance adds a section that the provisions regarding sexual orientation or gender identity shall not apply to religious institutions or other organizations operated for charitable or educational purposes owned, operated or controlled by a religious institution and prohibits the City from substantially burdening a person's freedom of religion. This ordinance states that the Maysville Human Rights Commission shall enter into a working agreement with the Kentucky Commission on Human Rights for discrimination claims except Maysville Human Rights Commission reserves to itself the resolution of claims of discrimination based on sexual orientation or gender identity. The Ordinance sets the process for filing and processing complaints and provides for hearing in front of a hearing officer appointed by the Maysville Human Rights Commission.

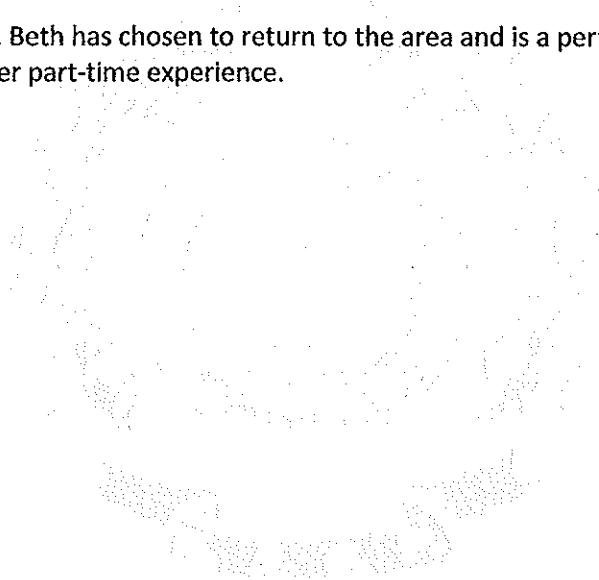


